Executive Director's report for January 26, 2024

Since our meeting in December, I have continued to meet with various board and advisory council members as well as donors.

I attended and spoke at the Harding Township Committee meeting regarding the proposed development of Glen Alpin on our corner. The room was packed with residents opposed to the plan (multi story 80 room hotel), many of whom spoke, including Julia Somers, Tom Ross from the National Park, and me.

Sue and I attended the Somerset County Business Partnership annual luncheon.

I had meetings with other NGOs to discuss potential collaborations in Paterson.

I met with three environmental land trusts to discuss the value of continued participation in the Land Trust Alliance.

Sandra and I met with the Spring Brook developer, engineer, and landscape architect to discuss tree removal and replacement. They seem amenable to everything we requested.

I participated in a Lower Passaic CAG meeting

"Why We Love NJ's Open Spaces" Dave Robinson, January 16

This evening briefing was scheduled and promoted as an in-person event. The day prior we had 21 registrants. In anticipation of the snowstorm, after some debate, we opted to change it to a Zoom webinar versus rescheduling. I sent an eblast to our full list (6300+ recipients) for one final push while also promoting the native plant webinar series and, wow! The email achieved a 52% open rate and registration closed at 89! We ended up with a total of 56 participants, which is more than double the number who registered initially. I asked participants to type in the chat box which they prefer, in-person or Zoom. The majority selected Zoom and some specified that's their preference during the winter months. Dave did a great job, as always!

Plant Sale Webinar Series


The programming team has scheduled four free monthly Zoom webinars with established speakers leading up to our 4th annual Plant for Pollinators online program in April. These have proven to be very popular webinars. The first of the series took place January 18. Registration closed out at nearly 300 with. These are similar to the numbers we saw in 2023 which is a great indication that our online plant program will be another big success!

Acquisition Mailings

As noted in my last board report, we are sending direct mail pieces to targeted neighborhoods with the sole purpose of prompting awareness and donations versus memberships. This was on the recommendation of Judith Hazelwood. Industry standard suggests a minimum of three separate contacts is required to engage a potential new supporter/donor. Following is the status:

Chatham and Summit Mailings (Postcards mailed to 3000 residents)

- First mailing: mid-September 2023 This direct mail piece focused on climate change-related weather events in New Jersey while promoting GSWA's mission. (You can view it on my December 2023 board report.) This piece yielded four gifts totaling \$750 (one of which was \$500!)
- **Second mailing:** mid-December 2023 This piece was sent to the same residents with a winter/holiday theme. (See next page.) To date, this has not yielded any donations.
- Third mailing: mid-February 2024 I'm in the process of crafting this piece. The theme will be GSWA's Native Pollinator plant webinar series and online program.

Once the venue is secured, we can then select the date.

Gala & Silent Auction – We fear people may be suffering from Gala fatigue. In hopes of breathing new life into our largest annual fundraiser, we are considering some radical changes. One idea we are investigating is Casino Night. This would entail hiring professionals to bring in gaming tables and run the games on our behalf. This type of fundraiser has proven to be lucrative for other non-profits. We are also considering hiring a professional game show company to run the event. Additionally, we are looking at different venues. We will need to determine what the event will be before we can select a venue and date. Again, suggestions are welcome.

Board Report: Membership and Social Media Overview

In FY 2024 Q2, I managed mailing lists, gift entries, and financial reporting for GSWA's second appeal, the Year-end Appeal. We sent appeal letters to 1567 names and emails to 6889 addresses, securing 135 gifts, totaling \$70,849 net after expenses, with \$8,899.50 from pure membership appeal.

Looking forward, the Communications, Membership, and Admin team is executing 2024 Q1 tasks outlined in our Strategic Plan. January focuses on Water Quality in the first 20 miles of the Passaic, February on Stewardship in the second 20 miles, and March on Education in the third 30 miles. I'm exploring partnerships for broader social media engagement.

Over the past two years, I have contributed to the Plant Sale Website, addressing technical issues that led us to consider a third-party site for the e-commerce segment. Currently, my focus in January and February is on rebuilding content on the Give Smart Fundraising platform. Collaborating closely with Give Smart, we anticipate a smoother experience for our Native Plant purchasers.

I'm scheduling a brief meeting with Board Adoptees, Marilyn Dee & Eric Inglis. My agenda includes detailing our 2024 Strategic Plan for Communications, Membership, and Admin goals and tasks. This proactive approach ensures that we align efforts and foster a coordinated approach towards our objectives.


